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From The Desk of Mr. Mitchell

Dear MCS Community Members,

Each year, our budget process is guided by the goals set for the District by the Board of Education (these goals can be found on our website). Three goals that are vitally important to the budget development, and to our capital project proposal, are:

We will:

- 1. Establish and maintain a safe and positive social, emotional and physical environment for all members of the Madison community.
- 2. Build relationships with our community, faculty, students, parents and staff to encourage engagement in student success.
- 3. Ensure that our community's tax dollars are allocated in a fiscally responsible manner with a focus on providing the best possible opportunities for our students.

The first item on the ballot for your consideration will be the proposed 2022-23 budget. Highlights of the budget include:

- Total adopted budget of \$11,660,590, a 4.28% spending increase over 2021-22
- Increase in State Aid, compared to 2021-2022, of \$463,776
- A proposed tax levy increase of 3.25% which will result in an increase of \$.50 per \$1,000 on tax on true
- Includes new faculty and staff positions and Connected Community Schools to help address students' academic and social/emotional needs
- · Maintains all existing student academic and extracurricular programming

The second item on the ballot for your consideration will be the proposed capital project. Major items to be addressed in the capital project include:

- the replacement of portions of the roof
- · installation of new windows
- upgrades to our PK-12 library and nurse's office
- upgrades to our elementary classrooms and bathrooms. The classroom bathroom updates will make them compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

More specific information about the proposed improvements to the building and grounds are included in this newsletter. The project, if approved, will have no anticipated financial impact on our taxpayers.

The third and final item on the ballot will be the vote to fill three (3) Board of Education seats. You will be asked to elect two (2) people to fill vacant seats, beginning on July 1, 2022 and expiring on June 30, 2026, and one (1) person to fill a vacant seat, beginning on July 1, 2022 and expiring on June 30, 2023. The candidate with the fewest votes will fill the shorter term.

The names of the candidates for the Board seats, as determined by random drawing, will appear on the ballot as follows:

- Brett Reiter
- Tobias Abrams
- Jennifer M. Lavoie

Our Budget Hearing will take place in our Auditorium on May 3, 2022 at 6:30 p.m. We will also hold a budget presentation at the Knoxboro Community Church on May 5, 2022 at 5:00 p.m. At both events, I will share information about the budget and the proposed capital project. I will also be available prior to our Grades 3-5 Spring Concert on May 12th for a Q&A session about the proposed budget and capital project. We encourage you to attend one of these informational sessions. The annual budget vote, which will include the proposed capital project and Board of Education election, will occur at Madison Central School on May 17, 2022 from noon until 8:00 p.m.

On behalf of the Board of Education, thank you for your continued support for MCS as we strive to move our district forward and to provide the best possible opportunities for our students. Go Blue Devils!

From Farm Beginnings To Fulbright Scholar, Tiffany Drape '98 Reflects On Path That Started At Madison

Hi, my name is Tiffany Drape. I graduated from Madison Central School in 1998. I'd like to thank Mrs. Mary DeLand for nominating me to do this, and I appreciate the opportunity. I grew up on a dairy farm on Center Rd., and I still return there when I come 'home' to Madison.

I attended Madison from kindergarten through twelfth grade. At Madison, I participated in a lot of extracurricular activities, sports, and received an outstanding education from knowledgeable, qualified, and caring teachers. The teachers made such an impression on me that I became an educator. I've taught for over 20 years in K-12, university, and adult education environments.

I earned an associate's degree in Journalism from Morrisville State College. After Morrisville, I moved on to Cornell University to receive a bachelor's in Communications, and a master's in Secondary Education. I taught agriscience and advised the FFA for one year in Argyle, NY, and for four years in Hamilton, NY. At Hamilton Central, I was also an adjunct faculty member with SUNY so students could earn college credits if they wanted to. The opportunity to complete a Ph.D. presented itself in 2008, and I moved to Blacksburg, VA to attend Virginia Tech.

I earned my Ph.D. in 2011 in the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences with a focus on education. I worked my way up in various research and faculty positions and am currently a professor at Virginia Tech.

I still recall my time in the classroom, my upbringing in agriculture, and my time at Madison when I'm teaching, mentoring students, presenting research, and providing professional development opportunities.

I've had the privilege to co-create and partner with agriculture producers and universities all over the world. I've worked in Nepal, Guinea, Kenya, and Rwanda and will complete a Fulbright Scholarship in Uzbekistan this summer. In Uzbekistan, I will be partnering with their agricultural engineering university faculty to expand their teaching techniques to students. My goal is to work with the constraints presented and not push solutions that will not work in the long term, are expensive, or ignore the cultural and societal norms of a place and its people. I often listen more than I speak.

These are not glamorous 'vacations'. They are usually the opposite, with far fewer comforts than we're used to. There are full days of working, teaching, collaborating with farmers of all kinds, and immersing into the culture. Being raised on a farm taught me so much. Most importantly to adapt, be flexible and to work within the situation presented.

My advice for students....

Manage your own expectations for yourself and your future. Becoming who we're supposed to be as humans is hard work, and failure means we're going to grow.

Be willing to be uncomfortable. No one learns much when they're comfortable.

Being raised in a small town can feel like both a blessing and a curse, but it does take a whole community to raise y'all.

Become a productive member of society. Whether it requires a GED, a Ph.D., or anything in between, you will find your purpose and there is no shame in any career path.

Life is a marathon, not a sprint. So pace yourself. Remember, you can always come home.







Madison Begins Exciting Partnership With Connected Community Schools



MADISON, NY - The Madison Central School District is pleased to announce that it has joined the Connected Community Schools family as a partner district beginning with the remainder of the 2021-22 school year. That announcement was commemorated with a ceremonial ribbon cutting on Thursday, April 21st in the MCS Auditorium.

The ceremony was widely attended by the MCS community. Honored guests included the Connected Community Schools staff led by Melissa Roys and Danielle Martin, State Assemblyman John Salka, State Senator Rachel May, Village Mayor Barbara Clark and media representatives from the Mid-York Weekly and Daily Sentinel.

The mission of Connected Community Schools is to ensure that the basic needs of students and families are met. When these needs are met, students and their families can succeed and thrive both inside and outside of school.

With the help of on-site staff members assigned to the district, Connected Community Schools will help to coordinate, streamline and deliver needed services to students and families so that they have the best possible opportunity to succeed. Supports exist in areas such as housing, food insecurity and medical, dental and mental health support.

Superintendent of Schools Jason A. Mitchell feels that student well-being is central to this new partnership.

"You only have to look around you here in this auditorium to see why we are here...our students," Mitchell told attendees. "Our partnership with Connected Community Schools is focused on doing all we can possibly do to support our students and their families."

Services can be accessed on-site at Madison Central School through the newly-established Connected Community Schools Hub. In addition to providing a starting point for support services, the Hub can provide students and families with no-cost essentials such as food items, hygiene needs and school supplies. They are available to any student or family with need. These essential items can make the difference for a student to be ready to learn, participate, and realize the maximum potential of their educational opportunities.

The initiative also provides embedded in-building programming, where community experts are invited to educate and organize engagement opportunities for students and families.

Connected Community Schools provides access to these opportunities through the power of the Central New York communities it serves. The Rome, NY-based organization combines the efforts of over 200 businesses and community-based agencies in pursuit of finding solutions to wide-ranging challenges facing students, their families and the school community.

As community support has grown, the number of school districts partnering with Connected Community Schools has grown. From their beginnings in the Rome City School District, the initiative has expanded its reach to serving local 13 school districts including Madison Central.
